

Some things need a lot of time. A pill for Fabry disease isn't one of them.

Galafold[®] (migalastat) is the first and only oral therapy for adults with confirmed Fabry disease and an amenable *GLA* variant.

Indication and Select Important Safety Information

What is Galafold?

Galafold[®] (migalastat) is a prescription medicine used to treat adults with Fabry disease who have a certain genetic change (variant) in the galactosidase alpha gene *(GLA)* that is responsive (amenable) to Galafold. It is not known if Galafold is safe and effective in children.

Before taking Galafold, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- have kidney problems.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if Galafold will harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. Galafold may pass into breast milk. Talk to your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby if you take Galafold.

Galafold[®] (migalastat) uses the enzyme you already have. It isn't enzyme replacement.

Galafold is the every-other-day oral therapy for adults with confirmed Fabry disease and an amenable *GLA* variant. It works by helping your alpha-galactosidase A do its job.

What does it mean to use the enzyme you already have?



In Fabry disease, fatty substances, also referred to as substrates, build up in a cell's lysosome (the cell's recycling center) because they can't be broken down properly. This is because a mutation or change in the galactosidase alpha (*GLA*) gene leads to defective or absent alpha-galactosidase A (alpha-Gal A), the enzyme responsible for breaking down these substances.

There are many mutations that can cause Fabry disease.

We refer to these as *GLA* variants. Some people with Fabry disease have variants that generate deficient, misfolded alpha-Gal A. This enzyme may just need some help from a chaperone like Galafold to work properly.

Know your variant.

Galafold can only work for amenable *GLA* variants. Talk to your healthcare provider to see if Galafold may be right for you.

How should I take Galafold?

Do not eat food, or take or drink any product that contains caffeine at least 2 hours before **and** 2 hours after taking Galafold to give a minimum 4 hour fast.



In order to break down fatty substances, alpha-Gal A needs to travel into the lysosome. But usually only properly folded enzymes make it into this part of the cell. Misfolded enzymes, like some of those seen in Fabry disease, cannot enter the lysosome and are broken down instead. For adults with an amenable gene variant, that's where Galafold® (migalastat) may help.



Even if you've had a test in the past that determined you have little or no enzyme activity, your variant may still be amenable to Galafold. It may just mean your enzyme can't get to the lysosome to do its job.

What are the possible side effects of Galafold?

The most common side effects of Galafold include headache, stuffy or runny nose and sore throat, urinary tract infection, nausea, and fever.



Galafold is a pharmacological chaperone.

As a chaperone, Galafold works by binding to the misfolded alpha-Gal A in individuals with an amenable *GLA* variant. This stabilizes the enzyme so it can get into the lysosome. Once inside, Galafold detaches from alpha-Gal A, allowing it to get to work breaking down fatty substances.

Every other day is Galafold[®] (migalastat) day.

Why every other day? To give your alpha-Gal A enough time to break down those fatty substances. For help keeping track, look to your Galafold pack.

How to Take Galafold.

Galafold is taken every other day at the same time of day and building Galafold into your routine can make it easier to remember.

Record your pill time so you take Galafold on time.

When life gets hectic, it can be hard to remember pill time—especially if Galafold is a new step in your routine. That's why each Galafold pack is made to help you keep track.

How should I take Galafold?

Do not eat food, or take or drink any product that contains caffeine at least 2 hours before **and** 2 hours after taking Galafold to give a minimum 4 hour fast.

When to take Galafold[®] (migalastat)? When the time is good for you.

Taking Galafold takes about a minute. When that minute happens is up to you, based on your routine and your eating schedule.

Pick a time that's convenient.

Because Galafold needs to be taken at the same time of day on an empty stomach, pick a time that works best for you and your eating schedule. The time doesn't matter, as long as you are consistent.



If you miss a dose of Galafold, take the missed dose of Galafold within 12 hours of your normal schedule. If more than 12 hours have passed, do not make up the missed dose. You should resume taking Galafold at your next scheduled day and time following your original every-other-day dosing schedule.

What are the possible side effects of Galafold?

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Galafold must be taken on an empty stomach.

Do not eat food, or take or drink any product that contains caffeine at least 2 hours before **and** 2 hours after taking Galafold to give a minimum 4 hour fast.

• Caffeine-free

You can drink the following during this time when you cannot eat:

Plain, flavored, or sweetened • Fruit juices without pulp 2 hours 2 hours No food or caffeine No food or caffeine I Take Galafold "I found it very simple to fast once I started.
